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Subcontracting Implemented



Subcontracting Plan Requirement

FAR 19.702(a) requires that all negotiated and sealed bid acquisitions that are expected to exceed \$700,000 (\$1.5 million for construction) <u>and</u> that has subcontracting possibilities, shall require the apparently successful offeror/ bidder selected for award to submit an acceptable subcontracting plan (see FAR 19.702(b) for exceptions).



Mandate for Separation Small Business Subcontracting Plans and Evaluation of Small Business Participation (SBPCD)



Assessment of a Small Business Subcontracting Plan and **evaluation** of SBPCDs are two separate yet related areas. They are treated differently in solicitations, during source selection, and in awards

DFARS 215.304 (c)(i)(B) states that proposals addressing the extent of small business performance <u>shall be separate</u> from Small Business Subcontracting Plans submitted pursuant to the clause at FAR 52.219-9 and <u>shall be structured</u> to allow for consideration of offers from small businesses

Assessing Subcontracting Plans



Subcontracting Plan Considerations

- 1. Requiring submission of the subcontracting plan with the bids or proposals (vice any other time before contract award) Note: It is customary for the Contracting Officer to require offerors/bidders to submit a subcontracting plan with its offer/bid, though FAR permits its submission within the (any) time limit prescribed by the contracting officer before contract award.
- 2. Determining (based on the market research), desired acceptable subcontracting goals (quantitative objective(s))
- 3. Determining (based on the market research), anticipated areas suitable for subcontracting (types of work)

- Small Business Subcontracting Plans are:
 - assessed to determine acceptability
 - May require negotiation to achieve acceptability
 - Are separate from evaluating small business participation
 - Divorce the cousins!!
 - Though divorced they are still related
 - <u>Not</u> evaluated
 - To be consistent with evaluated small business participation requirements
 - Required from other than small businesses only
 - Incorporated into the contract
